# Chairman's Report—December 2013

May I thank all of you for the magnificent support you have given me and your committee during this year.

This has been probably the least financially successful year since we formed some 17 years ago. However, I am confident that 2014 will be again be successful. Using funds carefully nurtured over the years we still managed to maintain donations to junior Scottish clubs and of course the London Scottish Academy.

Our magnificent President Sir Willie Purves has stood down after 7 years, but David Mackay a long term member and a VP for 10 years has kindly stepped in.

#### AGM

#### To All members of FoSR

We view FoSR as an absolutely core supporter of the LSA, especially as we continue to receive zero support from the SRU. Your funding has been key to the recruitment of Corne du Rand and Ross Peacock last year who are the two key operatives behind the re-establishment of the LSA this season. We now have a nucleus of 30 players and have played two matches so far this season. Five Individuals on the LSIL Board have each contributed £5k to get the ball rolling and we are now on the hunt for a major corporate sponsor.

It's little acorns at the moment but our ambition is to grow a mighty oak.

FoSR has been absolutely key to our efforts here and you have certainly helped us to keep the faith on this critical project. I think LSA will give you more bang for your buck and will also simplify and clarify your own objectives as you move forward in these straightened times.

I would be very happy to fix a meeting between FoSR and the newly appointed LSA Board/Staff to give you a full presentation of our plans and ambitions.
