# **Club Development Officers (CDOs)**

We have received a letter from Mark Dodson (CEO, SRU, permission granted to reproduce it) saying, albeit heavily edited for space reasons – The network of about 80 CDOs is a key area for developing the game in Scotland and achieving our strategic plan target of increasing the number of players for 2016. The main areas of CDO work are to develop rugby in schools and provide a pathway to clubs, to recruit and develop club coaches, to run competitions and coaching courses, and to identify and develop potential elite players.

With local authorities and the SRU providing about half the £21,000 annual cost of a CDO, it is challenging for clubs to cover the other half.

#### Cougars

ith assistance from FOSR, SRU and volunteer fund-raisers RHC Cougars is able to employ a Community Development Officer to promote rugby to children who have never tried the game before. This year a 12month programme will involve curriculum taster sessions in all nine schools, breakfast and after school clubs, holiday camps, and large inter-community festivals that will reach over 7,000 girls and boys aged between 8 and 17. Communities described by the Scottish Government as the most deprived in the country are being targeted. The support from FoSR is enabling the game to grow in hard-to-reach areas and attracting droves of children and parents as newcomers to rugby.

In 2003 Royal High School FP and Corstorphine rugby clubs merged to form RHC Cougars.
